Dayton: We'll help tell this story


from beginning to end.


Monday was the 100th Day celebration. Ms. Hall gave our class a 100th Day treat. Everyone got ice cream and stickers. And Holly and Dayton had a good laugh, too.

Group 1: Ms. Hall looked at her list. It showed 25 marks. That meant that all 25 of us had each put four pennies in the jar. But we were still missing eight pennies.

Group 2: "How can that be?" asked Ms. Hall. "If every child and I dropped four pennies in the jar, we should have one hundred pennies in the jar.

We made posters, we made lists. And we made them our own way.



Holly Our class kept counting up and up to the 100th Day.Dayton: We still needed eight cents more. But who still needed to pay?

Group 1: On Thursday there were even more pennies in the jar. Ms. Hall helped us count them by 10's.

10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80!

On Thursday, we had 80 pennies in the jar.

Group 2: On Friday there were even more pennies in the jar. We had a lot of pennies. We also had a problem.

Monday would be the 100th Day of School and we did not yet have 100 pennies.

Group 3: We counted our pennies by 1's. We counted them by 2's. We counted them by 5's, and we counted them by 10's.

No matter how we counted our pennies we did not have 100. That Friday, we still only had 92 pennies in the jar.

Holly Our class kept counting up and up to the 100th Day.Dayton: Our teacher said that we'd bring in 100 pennies to either spend or save.

Group 1: Ms. Hall made an announcement. She said that we were going to try to collect 100 pennies.

Ms. Hall showed us a big jar for collecting our pennies. She put a piece of paper next to the jar. We could each use the paper to make a mark showing we had brought in our pennies.

Group 2: 100 pennies sounded like a lot of money. But Ms. Hall said we would work together. She said we had 24 children in our class. She said she would put pennies in the jar, too. So we had 25 people in all collecting 100 pennies.

Group 3: Ms. Hall helped us understand we each needed to bring in four pennies. That way, we would collect 100 pennies.

Holly Our class kept counting up and upand to the 100th Day.Dayton: How many pennies were in our jar?

We counted in different ways!

Group 1: The pennies began to fill the jar.

On Monday there was only a small pile of pennies in the jar. Ms. Hall helped us count them by 1's.

1, 2, 3, 4!

On Monday, we had 4 pennies in the jar.



Group 2: On Tuesday there were more pennies in the jar. Ms. Hall helped us count them by 2's.

2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16!

On Tuesday, we had 16 pennies in the jar.

Group 3: On Wednesday there were even more pennies in the jar. Ms. Hall helped us count them by 5's.

5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 35, 40!

On Wednesday, we had 40 pennies in the jar.
