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The Pony Express




Group 1: Mail is one way people stay in touch. You can write a letter and put it in a mailbox.

Group 2: Or you can send mail with a computer. And your e-mail arrives in the blink of an eye!


Group 3: You can also call a friend who lives far away on the telephone!

So the Pony Express stopped working.




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Group 1: It took the men and their ponies 10 days to bring Billy's letter to Sally.

All: Run, pony, run! Run like the wind! Take my mail across the Wild West!




Group 1: A long time ago, it wasn't so easy to stay in touch. There were no phones and no computers.
