### Phonological Awareness

**RF.1.2.a** Distinguish long from short vowel sounds in spoken single-syllable words.

The color-coded **Sorting Sticks** represent each of the five short vowels in CVC words (green), CVCC words (red), CCVC / CCVCC (purple), plus the five long vowels (gold). The pictures appear on each end of the stick so they remain visible throughout the sort for support. Students sort the sticks into containers such as *Sorting City* (#308166), dry erase boxes that look like city buildings.

Before sorting, expose students to short and long vowels with activities such as word building and making vowel books with glued pictures. This will help ready students to distinguish vowel sounds in pictures using **Sorting Sticks**.


### English Language Learners


Talk about different pronunciations based on regional accents or students' native languages. This may come up in decisions students make when sorting by short vowel sounds. The way students from many different language backgrounds pronounce short a might resemble short o to the listener, which can easily become confusing when learning English short vowel sounds.

# Modeling Sorting with Sorting Sticks

At first have students compare short vowel sounds that are easy to distinguish such as short a vs. short o or short i vs. short u. Label two boxes with two vowels, such as a and o. Ask students to name all the pictures on the Sorting Sticks with you. Then pick up an a stick, such as can, name the picture again, and say, "I have can. Can makes the /a/ sound. Can goes in the a category." Next, choose a stick with an o picture, such as dog, and model sorting the dog stick into the o box. Pick up another stick and name the picture, such as cot. Ask

students, "Does cot have a middle sound like can or like dog?" When students produce the correct response, sort the cot stick into the o box. Continue sorting the pictures into the two boxes until all the sticks are sorted. Review the sort together.





Have students mix up the sticks and sort individually or in pairs or small groups. They divide the sticks, then take turns sorting into the boxes. Increase the number of sorting categories as students progress.
