


Using the **Story Twists**™, students practice both oral storytelling and creative writing. All the stories you can make using the **Story Twists**™ have three parts that can be manipulated—setting, character, and prop. Depending on which cube you twist, that part of the story will change. Students keep what they like and twist what they want to change.



Introducing the Story Twists™

Model this activity before students practice independently. The **Story Twists™** set the scene for creative storytelling and writing. Once stickers are placed over the corresponding words, some of the cubes will have images and others will have words. Focus on different story parts by keeping two parts in place and changing one. Encourage students to use their imagination and think outside the box.

vcbSelect a **Story Twist**, twist each cube a couple of times, and announce the setting, character, and prop. Focus on the function of the first cube—the setting. For example, "In the castle, there's a boy with a wand." Talk about what type of story could evolve from a castle setting: fantasy, adventure, mystery, and so on. Now twist the first cube to reveal a different setting—cabin in the woods. Talk about what that setting evokes and what story could emerge from it. Take notes during the brainstorm, recording sensory details related to the settings that could be used to build a story.



Next, change the focus to the function of the second cube—the main character. Using the preceding example, ask students to describe the boy, such as his age, personality traits, physical traits, and reason for being in the cabin. Twist the middle cube to reveal new characters—"two kids"—and talk about how they could change the story line.



Finally, change the focus to the last cube—the prop. Discuss the function of a prop: how the character/s could use it and how it could determine the genre or drive the plot. For example, finding a crown in a cabin could uncover a mystery in which a stolen crown is found, or a fantasy in which the crown could give the characters special powers. Twist the last cube to reveal a different prop—a ladder. Discuss how a different prop changes the story line. Discuss possible functions of a ladder versus a crown.

Continue twisting the cubes until you arrive at a story line that everyone likes. Use the Story Twist Reproducible to take notes and develop each part of the story.

Small Group or Whole Class Activity

Post the Picture Chart for student reference. Have groups of two to three students work together to build a story. After deciding on a story line, have student groups develop each part on the Story Twist Reproducible and then write the story. Have student groups take turns presenting their stories to the class.

Post the *Picture Chart* on the next page at your literacy center for student reference. Explain that names can be assigned to characters.
